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εἰς ὑπακοὴν πίστεως eis hupakoen pisteos

for obedience to the faith;

lit., for the obedience of faith (from faith, belonging to faith, to [with reference to faith])

Rom. 16:26, "but now made manifest, and by the prophetic Scriptures made known to all nations, according to the commandment of the everlasting God, for obedience to the faith—"

Matt. 28:19, "'Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Matt. 28:20, "'teaching them to observe all things that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age.' Amen."

Rom. 10:16, "But they have not all obeyed the gospel. For Isaiah says, 'LORD, who has believed our report?'

Rom. 10:17, "So then faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the word of God."

Gal. 2:20, "I have been crucified with Christ; it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me; and the life which I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me."

Rom. 1:6, "among whom you also are the called of Jesus Christ;"

Rom. 1:7, "To all who are in Rome, beloved of God, called to be saints: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ."

χαίρειν (*chairein*, greetings; cf. Acts 15:23; 23:26; James 1:1), Paul reshaped the greeting in all of his letters to convey his gospel.

Instead of χαίρειν he used χάρις (charis, grace), which was a distinctive emphasis of his gospel.

He also added $\varepsilon i\rho \dot{\eta} v\eta$ ($eir\bar{e}n\bar{e}$, peace), which was common in Jewish greetings (e.g., 2 Macc. 1:1; 2 Bar. 78.3) and signified in a holistic sense the well-being that belongs to those under God's favor.
