Justification and Reconciliation

Romans 5:10–11



Rom. 5:10, "For if when we were enemies <u>we were</u> <u>reconciled</u> to God through the death of His Son, much more, having been reconciled, we shall be saved by His life.

Rom. 5:11, "And not only that, but we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received the reconciliation."

καταλλάσσω katallasso aor pass part masc sing gen Adverbial of cause "Because we have been reconciled"

καταλλάσσω *katallasso* aor pass ind 3p Believers receive the action of reconciliation

- 1. The human race is in a legal state of hostility toward God because of Adam's sin.
- 2. No fallen human being can change this state of hostility.
- 3. The opposite of hostility is peace, harmony.
- 4. There must be a change of status, the legal penalty must be paid.
- 5. This payment is through death, the substitutionary spiritual death of Jesus on the cross.

2 Cor. 5:14, "For the love of Christ compels us, because we judge thus: that if One died for all, then all died;

2 Cor. 5:15, "and He died for all, that those who live should live no longer for themselves, but for Him who died for them and rose again."

2 Cor. 5:17, "Therefore, if anyone *is* <u>in Christ</u>, *he is* a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new."

2 Cor. 5:18, "Now all things are of God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Jesus Christ, and [who] has given us the ministry of reconciliation,"

2 Cor. 5:18, "Now all things are of God, who has <u>reconciled</u> us to Himself through Jesus Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation,"

καταλλάσσω *katallasso* aor act part masc sing gen to reconcile 2 Cor. 5:19, "that is, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not imputing their trespasses to them, and has committed to us the word of reconciliation."

God performs the action.

"The world" receives the action

"The world" = "their"



δι αὐτοῦ *dia autou* instrumental means "through Him" ἀποκαταλλάσσω (apokatallassō),

aor act inf of purpose; "to reconcile completely" only here and in Eph 2:16 Eph. 2:16, "and that He <u>might reconcile</u> them both to God in one body through the cross, thereby putting to death the enmity"

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aor act inf of purpose; "to reconcile completely"

adverbial of cause or means

"because He had made peace" or

"by means of having made peace"

Reconciliation is...

the work of God for man in which God undertakes to transform man's position of hostility to peace in order to make possible and actual eternal fellowship with a righteous and just God. **Reconciliation is...**

the work of God for man in which God undertakes to transform man's position of hostility to peace in order to make possible and actual eternal fellowship with a righteous and just God.

Reconciliation was accomplished forensically, in a legal sense, once and for all by Christ on the cross, reconciliation applies to each believer positionally only when a person has trusted in Jesus Christ as Savior.

Eph. 2:4, "But God, who is rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us,
