By What Standard? Colossians 3:16; Ephesians 5:18–20

Col. 3:16, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord." What We Have Learned

- 1. Col. 3:16/Eph. 5:18 list hymn singing first in the list of results of a life filled with the Word of God by the Holy Spirit.
- 2. One primary purpose of hymn singing is to teach one another and admonish/correct one another.
- 3. Other purposes:

To express our joy for God's work in our lives (defense, Ps. 5:11, 63:7 His grace to us, Ps. 13:6, 59:16; remembering His works, Ps. 30:4) to declare His name *among His people,* Ps. 9:11

- 4. Singing is not about evangelism, making nonChristians comfortable, attracting people to a local church.
- 5. Singing is not about how it makes us feel, but about describing and declaring who God is and what He has done.
- 6. Hymns, both music and words, must be evaluated according to some standard.

CULTURE

1. The popular meaning:

The quality in a person or society that arises from a concern for what is regarded as excellent in arts, letters, manners, scholarly pursuits, etc.

2. The meaning here:

The beliefs and behaviors that characterize a group of people, from a small group such as a family or team, to a large group such as an ethnic group or national entity.

The beliefs influence the values, priorities, actions of a group of people. In this sense, what the Bible speaks of as worldliness is really the culture of different groups of fallen, rebellious human beings.

Biblical Terms to Express the Beauty and Glory of God

⊐וֹט (țôb) Good, pleasant, beautiful, delightful, glad, joyful, precious, correct, righteous. Gen. 6:2, 24:16

(yāpâ) be fair, beautiful, handsome. Gen. 12:11, 12:14

יָצָרִי (*s^ebî*) beauty, splendor, magnificent, Ezek. 20:6

הָרַר (hādar) honor, adorn, glorify. 2 Chron. 20:21

1. The Bible uses a number of terms to express the beauty and excellence of God. These terms establish God as the standard of beauty.

Thus,

God possesses *intrinsic* beauty which is the standard of all excellence, splendor, magnificence, beauty, and glory.

Intrinsic Beauty

Beauty that is inherent *in* something, independent of a response produced.

A response produced relates to the subjective aspect, that may be tainted by corruption in a fallen world and a fallen culture.

2. Key verses

2 Chron. 20:21, "And when he had consulted with the people, he appointed those who should sing to the LORD, and who should praise the <u>beauty of</u> <u>holiness</u>, as they went out before the army and were saying: 'Praise the LORD, for His mercy endures forever.' " Job 40:9, "Have you an arm like God? Or can you thunder with a voice like His?

Job 40:10, "Then adorn yourself with majesty and splendor, and array yourself with glory and beauty."

Psa. 27:4, "One thing I have desired of the LORD, that will I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the LORD all the days of my life, to behold the <u>beauty</u> of the LORD, and to inquire in His temple." Psa. 104:1, "Bless the LORD, O my soul! O LORD my God, You are very great: You are clothed with honor and majesty,"


Gen. 1:31, "Then God saw everything that He had made, and indeed it was very good."


3. All CREATION was *tov*, beautiful, but was corrupted by sin. Therefore, our experience with beauty, or what we value as beautiful, must be understood to be under the post-fall corruption of sin.

Rom. 8:20, "For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of Him who subjected it in hope;

Rom. 8:21, "because the creation itself also will be delivered from the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God.

Rom. 8:22, "For we know that the whole creation groans and labors with birth pangs together until now."
