

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The Beginning and the End of the Rebellion Ephesians 6:10–13; Ezekiel 28:12–19; Isaiah 14:12–14



Eph. 6:10, "Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.

Eph. 6:11, "Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil.

Eph. 6:12, "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of the darkness of this age, against spiritual hosts of wickedness in the heavenly places.

Eph. 6:13, "Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

Eph. 6:10, "Finally, my brethren, be strong in the Lord and in the power of His might.

- 1. Only the Lord's power and might can protect us. (Eph. 6:10)
- 2. We engage that power by putting on the panoply ("full armor") of God. (Eph. 6:11a)
- 3. Only the full armor of God enables us to stand our ground. (Eph. 6:11b)
- 4. Why? Because our enemy is not flesh and blood, but the minions of Satan who seek to defeat us. (Eph. 6:12)
- 5. Conclusion: Take up the full armor of God in order to resist and stand our ground. (Eph. 6:13)

What are we to do?

Eph. 6:10, "Finally, my brethren, be strong by means of the Lord, that is by means of the power of His strength." [RD]

How do we do that?

Eph. 6:11a, "Put on the whole armor of God,"

Why should we put on the whole armor of God?





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As a major center of maritime trade, a generally wealthy and well-resourced power to the immediate north of Israel, we find the city of Tyre intersecting repeatedly with the biblical story.

Ezek. 28:11, "Moreover the word of the LORD came to me, saying,

- 1. Description of the anointed cherub from his creation, Ezek. 28:12–15a.
 - a. The seal of perfection,
 - b. Located in Eden, the garden of God,
 - c. Adorned with jewels similar to Israel's high priest,
 - d. The anointed cherub who covers,
 - e. Created by God, not born, *bara*, designates a direct divine creation.

- 2. The cause of the cherub's sin, Ezek. 28:17–18
 - a. Abundance of trade, Ezek. 28:16a
 - b. Mental attitude sins of arrogance, violence, sin, Ezek. 28:16b–17

The Rebellion Begins Ezekiel 28:11–19 Isaiah 14:12–14

- 1. God is bringing an army against Babylon, Isa. 13:2-5
- 2. This battle is described three times as "The Day of the Lord," Isa. 13:5–16 (vs. 9 "the wrath of the Lord ... in the day of His anger.")
- 3. One enemy is the Medes, which causes some to think this is historical. The modern group that lives in their territory is the Kurds, Isa. 13:17–18
- 4. The destruction is total, compared to Sodom and Gomorrah, Isa. 13:19–22

Heaven rejoices at the final destruction of Babylon.

Jer. 51:48, "Then the heavens and the earth and all that is in them shall sing joyously over Babylon; for the plunderers shall come to her from the north,' says the LORD."

Rev. 18:20, "Rejoice over her, O heaven, and you holy apostles and prophets, for God has avenged you on her!"

Following the destruction, Israel is united and obedient to the Lord.

Isa. 14:1, "For the LORD will have mercy on Jacob, and will still choose Israel, and settle them in their own land. The strangers will be joined with them, and they will cling to the house of Jacob.

Isa. 14:2, "Then people will take them and bring them to their place, and the house of Israel will possess them for servants and maids in the land of the LORD; they will take them captive whose captives they were, and rule over their oppressors."

Following the destruction of Babylon there is peace on the whole earth.

<u>Isa. 14:7</u>, "The whole earth is at rest and quiet [at peace]; they break forth into singing."

Following the destruction of Babylon there is peace for Israel:

Isa. 14:3, "It shall come to pass in the day the LORD gives you rest from your sorrow, and from your fear and the hard bondage in which you were made to serve,

<u>Isa. 14:4</u>, "that you will take up this proverb against the king of Babylon, and say: 'How the oppressor has ceased, the golden city ceased'!"

Have the prophecies of Isa. 13:1–14:7 been fulfilled?

1. Babylon will be destroyed suddenly and unexpectedly.

Isa. 13:1, "The burden against Babylon which Isaiah the son of Amoz saw."

<u>Isa. 13:3</u>, "I have commanded My sanctified ones; I have also called My mighty ones for My anger—those who rejoice in My exaltation."

Isa. 13:4, "The noise of a multitude in the mountains, like that of many people! A tumultuous noise of the kingdoms of nations gathered together! The LORD of hosts musters the army for battle.

<u>Isa. 13:5</u>, "They come from a far country, from the end of heaven—the LORD and His weapons of indignation, to destroy the whole land.

Isa. 13:6, "Wail, for the day of the LORD is at hand! It will come as destruction from the Almighty."

1. Babylon will be destroyed suddenly and unexpectedly.

Jer. 51:8, "Babylon has suddenly fallen and been destroyed. Wail for her! Take balm for her pain; perhaps she may be healed."

<u>Isa. 13:9</u>, "Behold, the day of the LORD comes, cruel, with both wrath and fierce anger, <u>to lay the land</u> <u>desolate</u>; And He <u>will destroy its sinners from it</u>.

Isa. 13:10, "For the stars of heaven and their constellations will not give their light; The sun will be darkened in its going forth, and the moon will not cause its light to shine.

<u>Isa. 13:11</u>, "I will punish the world for its evil, and the wicked for their iniquity; I will halt the arrogance of the proud, and will lay low the haughtiness of the terrible."

Jer. 50:3, "For out of the north a nation comes up against her, which shall make her land desolate, and no one shall dwell therein. They shall move, they shall depart, both man and beast."

Isa. 13:17, "Behold, I will stir up the Medes against them, who will not regard silver; And as for gold, they will not delight in it.

Isa. 13:18, "Also their bows will dash the young men to pieces, and they will have no pity on the fruit of the womb; Their eye will not spare children.

Isa. 13:19, "And Babylon, the glory of kingdoms, the beauty of the Chaldeans' pride, will be as when God overthrew Sodom and Gomorrah."

<u>Isa. 13:20</u>, "It will never be inhabited, nor will it be settled from generation to generation; Nor will the Arabian pitch tents there, nor will the shepherds make their sheepfolds there.

<u>Isa. 13:21</u>, "But wild beasts of the desert will lie there, and their houses will be full of owls; Ostriches will dwell there, and wild goats will caper there.

Isa. 13:22, "The hyenas will howl in their citadels, and jackals in their pleasant palaces. Her time is near to come, and her days will not be prolonged."

Jer. 50:39, "Therefore the wild desert beasts shall dwell there with the jackals, and the ostriches shall dwell in it. It shall be inhabited no more forever, nor shall it be dwelt in from generation to generation.

Jer. 50:40, "'As God overthrew Sodom and Gomorrah and their neighbors,' says the LORD, 'So no one shall reside there, nor son of man dwell in it'."

Jer. 51:29, "And the land will tremble and sorrow; for every purpose of the LORD shall be performed against Babylon, to make the land of Babylon a desolation without inhabitant."

At the bend of the Euphrates, between Babil and Kasr lie the ruins of the former village of Kweiresh, whose population migrated elsewhere a hundred years ago. The walls of mud brick still overtop the heaps of debris. The modern village of Kweiresh lies close to the Kasr, to which we must now turn our attention. The most northerly house of Kweiresh is the headquarters of our expedition ... called by the Arabs "Kasr abid."

3. The stones and bricks of destroyed Babylon will not ever be reused.

Jer. 51:26, "They shall not take from you a stone for a corner nor a stone for a foundation, but you shall be desolate forever,' says the LORD."

To this day there are men who have no other trade than that of gathering bricks from this vast heap and taking them for sale to the neighbouring towns and villages, and even to Baghdad. There is scarcely a house in Hillah which is not almost entirely built with them; and as the traveller passes through the narrow streets, he sees in the walls of every hovel a record of the glory and power of Nebuchadnezzar.

4. Jeremiah warns all Jews and believers to flee from Babylon prior to the destruction.

Jer. 50:8, "Move from the midst of Babylon, go out of the land of the Chaldeans; and be like the rams before the flocks."

Jer. 51:6, "Flee from the midst of Babylon, and every one save his life! Do not be cut off in her iniquity, for this is the time of the LORD's vengeance; He shall recompense her."

Jer. 51:45, "My people, go out of the midst of her! And let everyone deliver himself from the fierce anger of the LORD."

5. Israel and Judah are to be reunited in a time of spiritual revival.

Jer. 50:4, "'In those days and in that time,' says the LORD, 'The children of Israel shall come, they and the children of Judah together; with continual weeping they shall come, and seek the LORD their God'.

Jer. 50:5, "They shall ask the way to Zion, with their faces toward it, saying, 'Come and let us join ourselves to the LORD in a perpetual covenant that will not be forgotten'."

<u>Isa. 14:7</u>, "The <u>whole earth is at rest and quiet</u>; They break forth into singing.

Isa. 14:8, "Indeed the cypress trees rejoice over you, and the cedars of Lebanon, saying, 'Since you were cut down, no woodsman has come up against us.'"

Isa. 14:9, "Hell [Sheol] from beneath is excited about you, to meet you at your coming; It stirs up the dead for you, all the chief ones of the earth; It has raised up from their thrones all the kings of the nations.

Isa. 14:10, "They all shall speak and say to you: 'Have you also become as weak as we? Have you become like us?

Isa. 14:11, "'Your pomp is brought down to Sheol, and the sound of your stringed instruments; The maggot is spread under you, and worms cover you."


Isa. 14:12, "How you are fallen from heaven, O shining one, son of the dawn! How you are cut down to the ground, you who weakened the nations!"

- 1. The first statement is that this creature has fallen from Heaven.
- 2. This taunt is taken up at the time of this creature being sent to the lowest part of Sheol, "the lowest depths of the pit." (Isa. 14:15)

<u>Isa. 14:13</u>, "For you have said in your heart: '<u>I will</u> ascend into heaven, <u>I will</u> exalt my throne above the stars of God; <u>I will</u> also sit on the mount of the congregation on the farthest sides of the north;

Isa. 14:14, "'I will ascend above the heights of the clouds, I will be like the Most High."

Isa. 14:15, "Yet you shall be brought down to Sheol, to the lowest depths of the Pit."
