

**What the Bible Teaches
About**

**Intermarriage in
Israel**



1. In the Old Testament intermarriage with a Gentile was forbidden to a Jew.

Deut. 7:3, “Furthermore, you shall not intermarry with them; you shall not give your daughters to their sons, nor shall you take their daughters for your sons.

Deut. 7:4, “For they will turn your sons away from following Me to serve other gods; then the anger of the LORD will be kindled against you, and He will quickly destroy you.”

2. The only exception was if the Gentile was a believer. Notice the reasoning in vs. 3. If the Gentile is a believer, positive to doctrine, then they would not be a distraction. The Book of Ruth explains that this is legitimate.

3. Principle: intermarriage with an unbeliever would involve a Jew becoming a partner with a pagan and leading him/her into apostasy. This always happens. Don't get deceived by the concept of missionary dating.

4. The prohibition to intermarriage was not based on race, culture, or other human factors. This was never the issue. Moses had an Ethiopian wife. Racial intermarriage is never an issue in Scripture. Racial intermarriage is not wrong. When people of different races get married they need to be fully aware of certain cultural differences which might exist and be willing to face those challenges.

5. Later on the Pharisees made this prohibition racial, but that ignored the impact of Deut. 7:4.

6. In the New Testament the principle holds true. Believers are not to marry unbelievers.

2 Cor. 6:14, “Do not be bound together with unbelievers; for what partnership have righteousness and lawlessness, or what fellowship has light with darkness?”
